Jacob

Sibling Rivalry At It's Best

Read Genesis 25:21-23

Describe the rivalry between Jacob and Esau as depicted in Genesis 25. (Twins wrestling in the womb)

Two Nations in Rebekah's womb / Two Separate Peoples One will be stronger than the other The older will serve the younger

Read Genesis 25:25-26

What significance does the naming of Jacob and Esau hold in their story? Explain the symbolism behind Jacob's name and his characteristics.

Esau means The Hairy One. It says that he came out red & hairy, with a rug on. He grew up to be a man of the field, an expert hunter. He was also the 1st born and therefore held claim to the family birth right.

Jacob means Heal Grabber, contender, supplanter. He would spend his whole life grasping for something from men, that only God could give him.

Read Genesis 32:22-27

What is the importance of the question "What is your name?" in the context of Jacob's encounter with God?

Why that question? Because to answer it honestly, Jacob had to make an admission. Remember the meaning of Jacob's name. In essence, the Lord was asking him, "Are you going to continue living up to your name, deceiving others? Or will you admit what you are and let me change you?"

Discuss - How being alone with God allows for an opportunity of examination and reflection. Ask for volunteers for the discussion to maybe speak about a personal encounter (solitary time, a retreat...)

How does the concept of a "new name" relate to personal transformation and spiritual growth? (Genesis 3:28)

After having surrendered, Jacob was given a new name—Israel. God was saying, "You're no longer the 'heel grabber' or 'supplanter.' Instead, you're someone marked by Me and named by Me. **Israel - Triumphant with God.** I'm so glad that God doesn't call me by who I was or what i did. **He calls me what Jesus did... Forgiven, holy, righteous, new.**

A New name can allow you to walk in a Fresh calling and take you to the next level.

Discuss - How the story of Jacob wrestling with God relates to personal encounters with God in our lives. Have someone give an honest account of wrestling with God about a decision or request...

Anyone who has ever had a true encounter with the Lord leaves with a noticeable change. How is Moses' encounter with God, as mentioned in Exodus 3, connected to Jacob's wrestling with God?

Both asked God for His Name. When He answered (v15), he added the God of Abraham, the God of Isaac, and **the God of Jacob**. He says He's the God of Jacob, not the God of Israel. He's the God of your bad side, He's the God of your past.

Read Hosea 12:3-4

If you're desperate for breakthrough, then now isn't the time to fight God—now is the time to surrender and embrace your new name... Forgiven/child of God
